Pastor's Message

It is becoming more common to have non-religious funerals. I hear often that people don't want their funeral "too churchy," which I take to mean processions, hymns, and big, fancy church words. More and more people are wanting recorded songs (mostly non-religious and sentimental), someone to say nice things about the deceased, and maybe a prayer. That's it.

To be honest, that's not my cup of tea, but if the choice comes down to throwing some traditional things out of a funeral or not getting a chance to tell people how great Jesus is, well... I'm going with telling others about Jesus. I will say though that I draw the line that there must be scripture and I get to preach, those I won't budge on.

And while such funeral services are fine, I just wish everyone would know how powerful they *could* be. I wish people knew the symbolism and the scripture in an old-school, liturgical funeral, so I thought I'd share that with you.

The body of the deceased starts outside the sanctuary, symbolizing being on Earth, where it can be adorned in whatever way the family wants. When the funeral starts everything is removed whether that's flags, trophies, prized possessions, etc. The reason comes from Revelation four as the elders who worship before the throne of God cast down their crowns (their titles, achievements, prizes, etc.) symbolizing that everything they've ever had or accomplished has come from God and they are giving it back to the true authority.

The procession towards the altar is also symbolic of the deceased leaving their old life behind as they head towards the throne of God. ALC also has a funeral pall, a white cloth, that can cover the coffin which further symbolizes sinlessness, nakedness before God, and how neither of us is better than anyone else. It doesn't matter how expensive or cheap our coffin is, nobody sees it, we're simply saints in God's eyes covered by Jesus' forgiveness.

Before we go forward singing praises to God (just as the angels do around God's throne) the opening words of comfort are straight out of Second Corinthians and Romans. After the scripture reading and sermon comes the Apostles' Creed which further reinforces our belief that God loves us enough to suffer and die for us so that we might have eternal life along with the reminder that as the catholic (universal/all denominations) church and communion of saints that we have the support of God's body (all Christians) during our hardships.

After the prayers is the option to have communion (which I've yet to have requested). Communion is not only giving us forgiveness of

THE FUNERAL PALL

What does it mean?

All of you who were baptized in Christ have clothed yourself with Christ! Galatians 3:27

The funeral pall is used to cover the coffin during the service in the church. The pall enables all to come equally before the altar, just as God loves everyone, rich and poor alike grounded in their baptism.

The pall is white, the Easter color of resurrection joy. The sacred name of Jesus is symbolized with the cross.

The pall is placed over the coffin in the narthex (but could be placed after the greeting just before the reading of Romans 6) before the coffin enters the nave and is again removed in the narthex after the service.

By keeping the coffin covered during the service, the church's worship is directed to the altar. The pall is intended to remind the worshiper that they have been baptized into the name of the Triune God and therefore is covered with the robe of Christ's righteousness.

The old things have passed away, and all things are new. Because I live, you also live. John 14:19

sins but we are actually also getting Jesus' physical body and blood to strengthen us for the days ahead, and, even more than that, communion being the rite that unites the body of Christ to keep it strong even as it's hurting.

And last, but not least, and my favorite, the commendation, where I'm blessed and unworthy to lay my hand on the casket (or urn) to turn them completely over to God's care. Granted, I have no authority to accomplish that, but what I love about it is that it's the ultimate act of closure. We no longer have to worry about our loved one, they have fully and formally been entrusted into God's care and are better off now.

As morbid as this sounds I would invite you to think about your own funeral because they truly are one of the many beautiful things a congregation does. What scripture or songs would you like? Maybe try the funeral pall and ask for having communion; after all, you only get one funeral, and how nice would it be to have your family all in one placing and communing together?

Either way, Pastor Sarah and I always feel honored to preside at funerals and will work with you and your families so that it may be as godly and meaningful for you as possible.



SOUP & BREAD: DECEMBER 12th 5:30pm-7pm



News from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Southern Africa and the Ondini Circuit

Greetings to all in the congregations of the Shetek Conference! As 2021 draws to a close, and we enter the holiday season, I wanted to share with you some news from our partners in Southern Africa, so that we may better know their context and hold them in thought and prayer.

Phil Knutson, the ELCA Regional Representative based in Johannesburg writes:

ELCA World Hunger and Lutheran Disaster Response programs continue to support sustainable development projects in Southern Africa to assist companion churches as they work to mitigate the impact of poverty, HIV&AIDS, climate change and the COVID-19 pandemic in the communities they serve.

Young adults are also being trained as community leaders to mobilize action and awareness.

Lee Mazibuko, Chair of the Shetek-Ondini Partnership reports that due to the COVID 19 pandemic, church attendance has been poor, as people are afraid. There is a slight increase in attendance at the churches but not enough to support their pastors. They are hoping that with more people getting vaccinated that will improve.

Our partners are courageously continuing the ministry of the Gospel, in the face of the continuing struggle with HIV AIDS, the COVID-19 pandemic, and little revenue in congregations even to support their pastors. Yet, the word that our contributions to ELCA World

Hunger are at work is encouraging. We will be sending funds from the Shetek Conference to the Ondini Circuit soon for pastors' salary support, and assistance for agricultural projects, like the productive garden at Hoffenthal. Thank you for your prayers, and your financial support to ELCA World Hunger and the Shetek-Ondini Partnership!

CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES FROM November 9th, 2021 MEETING

• Bethany Contract - President Michalski reviewed the status of the contract with Bethany Lutheran; Pastor Adam noted their council has approved it, MM/S/C (Kevin/Sharon) for ALC to approve the contract and add it to the projected budget.



- New members Brent & Megan Bramdstedt, son, Copper and daughter, Lizabeth, Kirk & Alice Odden, Katie Ihler, son, Karter Pribyl and daughter, Kaisen Pribyl, Arland & Deb Polzin, Josh & Aimee Hilbrands, son, Peyton, and two daughters, Hailee and Harper were approved. MM/S/C (Kevin/Betty)
- Annual Meeting January 23, 2022 President Michalski reminded the council of the Annual Meeting
- Mid-Year Meeting July 17, 2022 President Michalski reminded the council of the Mid-Year Meeting
- Budget & Finance and MMC Budget Recommendations Kevin shared the motion from MMC and B&F to update the wages the church pays, based on a study from wages paid in southwest MN, and job reviews. This would then be placed in the 2022 budget, to be approved at the annual meeting. Discussion asked for the changes to be made, which Kevin provided. After being informed of the changes, the motion was seconded by Betty. MM/S/C
- MMC Recommendation MM/S/C (Betty/Kay) to approve the recommendation to remove the Christian Coordinator from probation.
- Board Redesign President Michalski asked the council to consider altering the number of members of some boards for quorum purposes, and to make filling the annual ballot easier, as it is getting more difficult to find volunteers. It was determined that the boards should discuss this at their next meeting and information would be taken to the mid-year meeting.
- Other President Michalski provided an update on the status of the Nominating Committee. Kevin provided a motion from Budget and Finance to allow Chloe Shamp to have 3 hours per month to provide Senior League programming. MM/S/C (Kevin/Sharon)

Board Reports

Worship and Music - Kelly updated the council on the holiday services, their board membership status, and noted they will have ideas for the Memorial Board project.

Spiritual Life and Fellowship - Sharon - this board will meet next week. They are planning on providing pies for after the Thanksgiving service and apple cider at the Living Nativity.

Discipleship/Marketing and Stewardship - Adam provided the information in Steve's absence - KLW programming will end next week; Pledge Days are approaching; they are discussing a processional offering, having the ELCA Regional Planner do a presentation again, and the possibility of updating the church web site to list projects and events interested parties may donate to.

Properties - Linda reviewed the Living Nativity, the snow removal bid from Negen's (which was accepted by Properties), the fixing of pastor's window, and items to donate.

Budget and Finance - Kevin reminded the council that the budget forms are needed soon as December 7 is their meeting date for the 2022 budget preparation.

Christian Education - Gina listed the numerous topics and events they are working on, which included 2022 Confirmation, Thanksgiving participation by the youth, Living Nativity, Bible Studies, and the Christmas program.

Applying Bible Principles

"For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil" (1 Tim. 6:10).

How would people describe you? Are you one who "loves" money? Is your life marked by a continual inordinate concern about and striving for money? If so, then perhaps you are one who truly "loves" money.

Money is neutral. It is neither good nor bad. What matters is our attitude towards it. If we view it as a means to an end, a means of exchange, and something God can use in our lives to bring glory to God, then we probably do not love money. On the other hand, if we are always wanting more and more money, if we will do just about anything to obtain it, and if we think about money more than anything or anyone else, we likely are guilty of loving money. In that situation, it has become a "god" to us, and we bow at its altar in continuing service in order to obtain more of it.

If you are determined to get rich, no matter what, before you continue that lifestyle, read Paul's admonition to Timothy in 1 Timothy 6:9-10. Consider Solomon's counsel in Proverbs 11:28 and Ecclesiastes 5:10-11. And think about the words of the Lord Jesus in Matthew 6:24, who said, "No one can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

Or as Jesus would say, "Let anyone with ears listen."


