Pastor's Message

I got elected to the synod council and at our last meeting we were working on a vision statement for the synod and one of the ideas was to say something about the synod being a place that's inclusive. Well, at that point I had already drank too much coffee which caused my ADD to really kick in and mentally I went on a rollercoaster ride of tangents.

Because my parents are both salespeople my brain is always trying to come up with ways to sell things. One of the tangents I started going down was thinking, "That's why people should want to go to church? Just because it's inclusive?"

For the record, the person who said inclusivity was right on and it was a good idea, but it caused me to think about inclusivity as a selling point. Because really, just because a club will let you in doesn't mean it's worth going to. There's a lot of clubs out there that I qualify for that I don't want to join simply because they don't do things that I want to do.

So I sat thinking that just because you *can* go to church, just because they would let you in, why would a person bother to spend an hour a week there? Why would anyone *want* to join that club? What do we have to offer?

One selling point I've heard about the church is that it's a supportive place where people care for one another, which is good and true, but, again, my tangential ADD tells me that adults form the same supportive relationships with other parents while their kids are at dance lessons or sitting in the stands during sports games. We definitely don't have the sole source of supportive and caring members.

My wild wonderings ended up bringing me to asking myself why I go to church when I have so little free time, especially since I can get inclusivity and support and care from so many other places that I already attend and what came back was what I really love about church: peace.

What I love about worship is that it's a place that doesn't expect much from me. It's a place that isn't driving me from one thing to the next. It's not a place that's going to give me a list of things that my family needs to do and pay for and work towards that's sapping me of my energy.

What I love about church is it's like a parent who grabs you by the back of the collar as you run by and then sits you down. Making you, in a sense, stuck. There are going to be prayers you wouldn't have prayed, Bible readings you wouldn't have read, music you wouldn't have heard or sung that seeps into your soul, sermons that cause you to think about things you would not have thought about, all because you're just being stuck in this place for an hour.

A place where I'm not called to live up to something because I'm told from the beginning that I'm not good enough for God. That I can't be, and therefore, I don't have to break my back trying because God already loves me and blesses me and provides for me; so simply be thankful and soak it all in. A place where you're simply loved and allowed to just sit and be. A place to just calm down your ADD mind for an hour.

So yes, we most definitely have inclusivity. And yes, we most definitely have loving and supportive relationships. But what we really have to offer that nobody else has that I find I need more and more of is peace in this relentless world.

So, if you're looking for a reason for why to go to worship, or people ask you why you worship and you can't articulate it, hopefully this helps. The world is continuously demanding more and more from us while worship is full speed in the opposite direction telling you to sit, relax, let go, and just be. We'll get the praying, singing, Bible reading, sacraments, and preaching done, you just sit there and soak it in. Hear God. Know God. And leave feeling blessed by God.

CHANGING THE CONSTITUTION **UPDATES:**

- **Council** has voted to take the last three words off of the by-law C23.01.01 which reads: While the buildings of the congregation shall be open to all people to share in its worship, instruction, pastoral care, and fellowship, the congregation rejects all fellowship with organizations, secret or open, which are avowedly and religiously racist or violent or which practice forms of religion contrary to the Word of God and Lutheran Confessions. The change would make it possible for congregations of other Christian denominations to use our congregation for worship. This will be voted on at our annual meeting in January and needs a majority to pass it.
- Council has approved updating the constitution to the ELCA Churchwide standards. This will need a majority vote at our next annual meeting. The specific changes are in a document in the narthex. We can also email you that document if you wish, simply let the office know.



God's work. Our hands.

Dear friends and companions in ministry,

I share Paul's sentiment when he says, "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now" (Philippians 1:3-5). I want to let you know what has been happening on my end of that sharing here at the United Theological College of the West Indies (UTCWI). The semester is drawing to a close, and when I think back on these last couple of months, what stands out are the moments when I got a chance to see my students engaged in ministries of care outside the classroom. I will tell you about three such moments.



Every September, we start the academic year off with two "Quiet Days", during which we reflect on a particular theme. This year the theme was "Caring for God's Creation." On day one we went to the local botanical garden to relax in its beauty and to consider our relationship as humans with the nonhuman parts of God's creation. On day two we worked together to care for the grounds of our own campus. In the photo above you see students Jean Ridler Jules and Aldwayne Brooks at work along with lecturer Rev. Dr. Dave Hazle.

November 2022

Throughout the semester I have had the pleasure of teaching my favorite course, Early Church History. Six of the students in the course are members of a Catholic religious order called the Missionaries of the Poor, founded here in Jamaica by Rev. Richard Ho Lung, who also composed liturgical music Caribbean-style. (Some of you might know his "Lord's visit to their monestery in downtown Kingston and to one of their ministry

Prayer".) The students welcomed me on a visit to their monastery in downtown Kingston and to one of their ministry centers there, called "The Lord's Place". Even though they are not part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, they truly do what the ELCA's motto above says, "God's Work. Our hands", as they minister to the most vulnerable:

children with severe disabilities, people living with HIV, and the very elderly. I was especially touched by the high level of professional care that they were providing for the 54 children that I saw, most of whom cannot walk or talk, and by the warmth of friendship and love that they shared with the children as well as with the elderly and those living with HIV. In the photo you see Brothers Johnson Talaban and Prasant Kispotta, Missionaries of the Poor and students of early church history.

At the time of my visit, what we were studying in class was the martyrs of the early church and the way in which the Christians made shrines over the graves of the martyrs so that they could visit them there to remember and honor them. The brothers were making a live connection with what they were studying in class because in 2005 two of their brothers had been shot to death over the wall of their monastery as they were washing the dishes. Brother Johnson, who had been washing dishes with them, showed me their graves on the monastery's grounds, which have become shrines for those who wish to honor them for their lives of faith and service.



From death to life. The most recent visit that I made with students was to "Mary's

Child," a home for pregnant teenagers and young mothers, also operated by a Catholic organization called "The Mustard Seed". In the photo you see a representative of the home receiving a box of donations from the students, who are Aldwayne Brooks, Rafael van Ommeren (our Lutheran student), Jean Ridler Jules, and Chioma Henry. Chioma (in blue) was especially thrilled to be able to hold babies to her heart's delight as we spent time with the young mothers. I am the one squatting in the photo, grateful to have had the opportunity all semester to see the caring ministries that our students do when they are not in class.

I know that, in addition to your support of me in my work with these students, you are involved in a variety of other caring ministries as well, and I pray that God will strengthen you in faith, joy, and love as you do your work.
