Pastor's Message

Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith.

-Galatians 3:24

A buddy gave me a facebook post from a friend of his titled, "I used to be Christian." The author talks about growing up in the church and striving to love God and be the best Christian she could be. She says, though, that the church had filled her with guilt, shame, and self-hatred. She was terrified of going to Hell. When she had questions she was ignored, ostracized, or told she needed more faith. She said that the leaders she looked up to used the Bible for their own selfish gain. She found a god in the Bible that she says delights in wiping out civilizations including women and children for God's own design flaw and she ends her opening statements with: The Christian church caused me more harm than good.

Now, are there denominations and certain congregations where it is really easy to believe that this happens to people? Definitely. There are congregations where guilt and shame are doled out heavily. There are preachers who know how to get you to give them money so that they can have their mansions and multiple personal jets. There are congregations that do not want your questions and that preach a racist god that *does* delight in the destruction of people and families that are not like us.

One of the many things I love about Lutheranism is our doctrine on Law and Gospel. Law, reminding us that we are sinners, we can't be perfect, and will continue to hurt God and others often. Gospel, meaning that Jesus died to forgive all of our sins, always and forever.

So yes, Lutherans will say that we will feel shame and guilt and sometimes we won't like ourselves. We all have those days when we take our anger out on others and we say hurtful things and, once seeing the pain in our loved one's face, we feel shame, guilt, and we're not happy with ourselves. Those feelings come with sin and Lutherans don't sugarcoat it or sweep it under the rug. We blatantly say that we sometimes come to worship with hurt hearts from hurting those we love and hurting ourselves. Sometimes we come to worship with shame and low self-esteem. This is the life of a Christian.

But we don't stay there. We come and confess, get forgiven (Gospel), and start fresh.

Have some Lutheran congregations had money-loving pastors that have taken advantage of people? Unfortunately. But predominantly our denomination has used its money very well, just look at all our Lutheran charities. Not to mention that our congregation has managed her funds well and, as far as I know of our history, there has been no concerns about mismanaged funds (although I am still waiting for my first private jet).

As for the god of wrath of the Old Testament, well, the civilizations destroyed by God were notoriously evil civilizations engaging in child sacrifice/torture and religious prostitution where teenage girls were basically forced into it. It was a lose-lose situation for everyone.

So yes, there are trauma-causing congregations out there, that is true. But I would say ELCA congregations, and especially our congregation, are among the least trauma causing. They're places where questions can be asked, no matter how tough or controversial. Places we can bring in our shame and guilt and get them removed. Places that are financially generous without people pushing you to constantly give more. Places of Law and Gospel that I'm willing to bet the majority of people raised in this congregation, even if they rarely worship now, would still say that this place did more good than harm in their lives. In fact, I would hope you would ask those members who haven't worshipped in a while their thoughts on that, just for research purposes, and get back to me.

Either way, may this place continue to do you, and all people, good. Amen.



CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES FROM September 12, 2023 MEETING

(Written minutes to be approved at the next Council meeting.)

- Update on the July Treasurer's Report: As it stands the amount had already been brought in to a previous month and put into a designated fund. Everything balanced out in the end.
- Church Council
- MM/S/C by Kevin Heggeseth and Cory Pohlman to transfer the signature rights from Gina Hauge to
 Melanie Shamp. Motion was approved. Melanie Shamp is the new Administrative Assistant at American Lutheran Church.
- Stewardship in a Box Program presented to Steve Johnson and Pastor Sarah in a webinar by Grace Pompero. It was provided by Lutheran Seminary and approaches stewardship from a Midwestern perspective. The theme of this program is "You've Heard It Said." The purpose of this program is to help people understand what their money goes for during the week. Possible ideas would be to spread stewardship throughout the year instead of lumping it all together in the month of November during Stewardship month. MM/S/C by Steve Johnson and Kay Evers. The Budget and Finance Board also approved the Stewardship in a Box program and will pay \$289.00. This will include material for rebranding for flyers and mailers.
- Update given by Lindsey Cartwright and Chris Tailorwright on the Security Cameras on the church campus. The cameras: Are covering entries and exits, and are there for the purpose of security and safety. There are nine cameras, they are always on but only records when there is a detection. Roles for the security system, as proposed by the Technology Committee. Administrator Chris Tailorwright, Secondary Administrator Ryan Evers, Viewers Chair of Technology Committee, Administrative Assistant and Lead Pastor. Most likely the program for viewing will be placed on the Administrative Assistant's Computer. The next step is to get control of the Wifi usage. Currently, we have no access to the Wifi connection in the church. Discussion and questions were asked by the Council regarding whether volunteer janitors have access to surveillance when closing the building. Also, the idea of posting a sign at each entry regarding, "This building is under video surveillance." Lindsay Cartwright wanted to stress the message, "We are not out to get people, but rather to provide safety and security."
- Other A reminder to the boards that if they have something that they are thinking about raising money for, they can place it on the Memorial Board. Contact the Budget and Finance Board to get your board's fundraising idea on the board.



Dear friends and partners in global ministry,

September 2023

This is the time of year when many of us head back to school to teach and learn, and even those of you who don't go back to school support and pray for us who do. All such support and prayers are welcome and received with gratitude! Here at the United Theological College of the West Indies (UTCWI), where I teach church history to students preparing for ministry in various churches of the Caribbean, we have just completed our first week of the semester with a batch of new, eager students.

I am pleased to have the company of another Lutheran on campus this semester. The Rev. Danielle Dokman from Suriname is here, taking a course in contextualizing theology for the Caribbean as part of her studies toward a PhD from Luther Seminary in Minnesota. She plans to write her dissertation in the area of Old Testament Studies, discerning the message that the minor prophets, Haggai and Zechariah, have for Caribbean peoples. These prophets wrote at a time when the Jews who had returned from exile in Babylon were

trying to rebuild their temple and their shattered community after its experience of defeat, trauma, and displacement in exile.

Constructing a community of love in the midst of hardship is no easy task, but it is a necessary task, and one to which Jesus has called us as Christians. That was made clear to me in our first event of the school year here at UTCWI. We started off the semester by worshiping together with a local congregation, the Hanover Street Baptist Church in downtown Kingston, where one of our alumni, Rev. Franklyn Small, serves as pastor. It is a congregation with an important history now loving people in a rough, impoverished

neighborhood. The sermon was about the command that Jesus gave his disciples in chapter 15 of John's gospel just before his arrest. He said that they should be a community in which people loved each other, as Jesus himself demonstrated that

evening by washing the feet even of Judas, who would betray him, and Peter, who would deny even knowing him. The love for which the community should be known, Rev. Small insisted, is not a feeling but is instead an action, a way of putting ourselves out for the benefit of others. We saw such love in action as each person present in worship that day was treated as a VIP: Visitors were recognized as they stood to receive a welcome; people celebrating birthdays and wedding anniversaries received congratulations, songs, and words of encouragement; children recited memory verses from the scriptures; and people returning from a time of absence along with those who had just carried out some special project on behalf of the congregation were lifted up publicly and with joy. Our president, Rev. Dr. Oral Thomas, greeted the congregation, two of our new students read the scripture lessons, and Sister Alicia Steele, second-year Methodist student from Guyana, sang a beautiful rendition of "How Great Thou Art." We were there for three and a half hours, and worship was still going on when we left.

This congregation has been shaping community out of hardship for centuries. It has a venerable history. It is the heir to the first Baptist church in Jamaica, a congregation founded by George Leile in 1784. George Leile had been living in slavery in South Carolina until he was freed to serve as pastor of a black congregation near Savannah, Georgia. This area was held by the British during the Revolutionary War, and the congregants were offered their freedom if they did not side with the rebels. But when the rebels won, the black people who had taken the British side had to flee. George Leile fled to Jamaica and started several Baptist churches, the first

of which was Windward Road Baptist Church. When the congregation outgrew the building, they constructed the Hanover Street Baptist

Church in 1822, a remarkable achievement, since most of the members were still in slavery at that time, awaiting emancipation, which finally took place in 1838. I hope their example is an encouragement to you who work hard at building communities of love.

Take heart! Your labor is so important that it was the last thing Jesus talked about with his disciples before he died.
