Pastor's Message

All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.

-Acts 4:44-47a

When government funding to USAID got cut that caused the ELCA refugee charity to lose a substantial amount of their funding. To be honest, this got me upset for quite a while when I heard this. Well, I'm still upset, but it did get me thinking.

Back when Obama was making a case for the Affordable Care Act he ended up making a gaffe when comparing it to the post office saying that Fed Ex is doing fine while the post office is always having problems, unintentionally saying that private businesses do better than government controlled ones; just about everyone agreed with that gaffe.

In 1918 there was an influx of refugees from Europe following WWI leaving war-torn countries searching for stability. It was we Lutherans who simply stepped in, on our own, with our own funding, to help set up these families and get them on their feet. Ever since then we've been at that work. To this day our charity scores a 100% rating on the charity scale with 91% of donations going to supporting immigrants and refugees.

In fact, we Lutherans are so good at ministering to those in need that the government actually asked our help in 2018 to deal with the crisis at the Mexican border, which is where we started receiving government funding to help even more people.

Now, all of us will not agree on whether USAID should be funded by the government or not, but I would hope that we could all agree that the Holy Spirit has empowered our denomination to do God's will in the world and that God has acted through us since our refugee organization's inception to care for Jesus throughout the decades. Whether we have government funds or not will not stop Lutherans from caring for the stranger (Heb 13:2) and for the least of these (Matt 25:40).

With the defunding of USAID it got me thinking about what a great opportunity we Lutherans/Christians have now to show our true colors and to go back to the early Church's roots by living like the first Christians did as stated above, that is, to pool and share what we have with those who have less so that all are taken care of.

How easy it would be for us to throw in the towel after losing the blessing of all that government money that has helped thousands worldwide. But, as we started out with very little, and as the early Church started with very little, and how they both blessed so many with so little, Global Refuge is pivoting to keep finding ways to serve the stranger and the least of these.

What's cool about this is that we get to show the world that we're not powered by the backing of the US government, but instead, like the early Church, it is common, regular, working folk who gladly welcome the stranger and least of these in the world. I would hope that as the government keeps shrinking that our taxes would plummet so we could all give more to these awesome Lutheran charities, but, even if that doesn't happen, we Lutherans managed to sacrifice enough during the hard economic years of 1918 and 1919 to help 500 plus people.

All this to say that we are the body of Christ, able to do powerful things through Jesus, even without the support of the government. That we Christians are a powerhouse for good in the world whether the times are favorable or not. May we therefore continue to live as those of the early church did, by sharing and sacrificing our resources to make sure that the stranger and the least of these has enough, knowing what God can do with only five loaves and two fish.






GLOW and More!


Dear friends and partners in ministry,

March 2025

Greetings to you from Guyana, where I have just begun my second year of work with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Guyana (ELCG), helping it to develop its leadership training programs. Part of my work here involves visiting the congregations of the ELCG to learn more about them and to support them by preaching. On Ash Wednesday, I was preaching for the three congregations of St. John parish, and together we heard these profound words from Paul in 2 Corinthians 5:21, "For our sake God made Christ to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Christ we might become the righteousness of God." These words make both Christ's death and his resurrection ours. We prayed that our Lenten reflections would enable us to realize how deeply we are involved in the story of Jesus' death and resurrection, so that we might know the joy of God's salvation. I include you in that prayer, too.

When I am not preaching, I am coordinating the church's Lutheran Lay Academy, which started a new semester in January. The students are taking two courses: Preaching, and Creeds and Confessions. The preaching course is being taught by Rev. Dr. David Kuck, a retired ELCA missionary who taught for 23 years in Jamaica and who wrote the textbook the students are using, Preaching in the Caribbean. It is such a treat for the students to have him as a teacher!

I am teaching the Creeds and Confessions course, using the Book of Concord. Since we do not have time to read the entire Book of Concord, we are concentrating on the creeds, the catechisms, and the Augsburg Confession, because those confessional documents are given primary importance in the Constitution of the ELCG, just as they are in the Constitution of the ELCA. It is the first time that a course like it has been taught in the Lutheran Lay Academy, so the students are really encountering something new, and we have interesting discussions in class. I will share with you some of the highlights so far.



We opened the course by celebrating the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed. As the students explored the history of the Creed and events commemorating its anniversary, what struck them was the global nature of the Creed. They realized that when they say the creed in their congregation, they are saying it with churches all over the world (including yours!) and way back in time. They said it makes them feel part of a worldwide church.

From the Creeds, we moved to Martin Luther's Small and Large Catechisms, beginning with the Ten Commandments. In his explanation of the commandments, Luther repeats a pattern: "We are to fear and love God so that we do not do X, but instead do Y." In other words, he views each commandment not only from a negative angle but also from a positive one. Thinking positively about the commandments was a new exercise for most students. As we tried it on the eighth commandment, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor," one student imagined a scenario that kept opening up more and more possibilities for her. The situation she imagined was that of a neighbor who goes out every night and leaves her children alone. The student applied the eighth commandment to this situation by saying that we should not gossip about this neighbor, but instead, we should speak directly with her. Then the student realized that this might lead to another step: We might learn something about our neighbor and her situation that would put the whole scenario in another light. We would come to understand our neighbor better. Then the student took this yet a step further: If we learned that this neighbor was not negligent, but had to go out to work, we might offer to care for her children from time to time. Through this one

student's chain of ideas, the whole class saw how thinking about the commandments positively widens their meaning and allows us to see more ways we can do good to one another.

In his catechism, Luther follows the Ten Commandments with the Apostles Creed and the Lord's Prayer because we do not keep the commandments well, so we need to hear in the Creed about what God has done and continues to do to rectify us as we remain connected to God's work through prayer. I asked the students to identify the sentence from Luther's explanation of the Creed that meant the most to them, and the majority selected something from the first article of the Creed, the article on creation. One student chose, "I believe that God has created me together with all that exists," and he wrote that this made him think of God's act of creation in a new way: not only as something that happened once a long time ago, but also as something that happens daily, even in our own lives. Another student underscored that by highlighting, "God made me."

In our next class, we will study the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. I am going to put stress on Baptism because it has been sadly neglected in the Caribbean. Until the middle of the eighteenth century, the baptized Dutch and English plantation owners, including the few Lutherans among them, refused to allow baptism to be administered to the enslaved Africans who worked for them because they feared the changes that this would bring to the relationship between them. Even after baptisms were permitted on the plantations, the evangelists did not tell the newly baptized much about the meaning of their baptism. In 1807, a special abbreviated Bible was published for use in instructing the enslaved: Select Parts of the Holy Bible, for the Use of the Negro Slaves, in the British West-India Islands. It contains none of the passages from Paul's letters about baptism as a dying with Christ and a rising with him to a new life.

The legacy of slavery has been long and hard. Even though now everyone has access to the whole Bible, baptism as an act of mercy lavished on us by God, and as the reception of a rich, new identity in Christ, has been undervalued here. It is presently

overshadowed by a view of baptism as our decision, our act of public commitment, and our sacrificial offering of ourselves to God. I hope that when the students read what Luther says about baptism, it gives them a new perspective and helps them appreciate the depth of the gift that they have in their baptism.
